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Matthew Marr will be joining IAS in Fall 2008 filling a new faculty position created in sociology to expand the field of Japanese studies as funded by a grant from the Japan Foundation.

Dr. Marr will be specializing in the research and teaching of Japanese society comparative and global This contexts. will enhance the development both our inter~ disciplinary Japanese Studies Program and the focus on studies of East Asia society in the Depart~ ment of Sociology/ Anthropology.

Dr. Marr has a PhD in Sociology from UCLA with a research specialization in Urban Sociology, including the role of homelessness and minorities in relation to

Marr's globalization. dissertation was written on "Better Must Come: Exiting Homelessness in Two Global Cities, Los Angeles and Tokyo." was also a Postdoctoral **Fellow** Harvard at University's Edwin Ο. Reischaur Institute of Iapanese Studies.

"We are very happy with the increase of our Japanese Studies program and look forward to the future growth that Dr. Marr can bring," said Steven Heine, Professor and Director of Asian Studies.

With the creation of this new position, additional courses will be offered to accommodate the increasing demand for courses on contemporary Japanese society and politics that complements the teaching of traditional language and culture. The result should be a steady flow of upper division and graduate level courses that will facilitate the growth of the Asian Studies certificate, B.A. and M.A. programs.

Richard Tardanico, Chair of the Sociology/ Anthropology Department has commented that his faculty and students are enthusiastic about this development.

When asked about coming to FIU, Marr stated, "I am extremely excited to be joining FIU's Institute for Asian Studies and hope to contribute to its growth, specifically by promoting interest in the study contemporary Japanese society among undergraduate graduate students.

# DUAL DEGREE PROGRAM APPROVED

The Institute for Asian Studies and the International Relations Department jointly proposed a dual M.A. in Asian Studies/Ph.D. in International Relations program, which was approved for Fall 2009.

This program encourages students with an interest in Asia to pursue graduate studies at FIU at advanced levels.

The combined degree program enables students to complete the Asian Studies MA as part of their progress towards the International Relations Ph.D.

The proposal was carefully reviewed at the departmental and college levels. A key factor is the tremendous strength in Asian Studies curriculum in the IR department.

The faculty with an East Asian concentration include Tom Breslin (China Foreign Policy), Paul Kowert (Japan/US Relations), and Julie Zeng (Chinese International Political Economy).

The proposal was supported by Dean Ken Furton as part of a trend for creating synergies between disciplines and area studies programs.

# SPOTLIGHT ON PROFESSOR LI MA



Li Ma (a.k.a. Mali) is the Assistant Director of Chinese Cultural Programs at FIU and an instructor of Chinese Language. For two years, she has taught Chinese language courses at FIU from Chinese I through V and Business Chinese. Mali was instrumental developing

implementing a standardized curriculum for the entire Chinese program, helping to provide a smoother transition and better retention rate for all Chinese courses at

FIU. Mali's efforts have helped a tremendous growth

in Chinese language enrollment. Her courses emphasize skills in reading, writing, listening, and speaking Mandarin Chinese. This skill base enables students to meet the requirements for the Chinese Studies certificate program and also prepare for the HSK standard proficiency exam.

In addition to her teaching responsibilities, Mali has worked closely with IAS on several grant projects and outreach programs. These programs include a Chinese summer camp program for K-12 students which took place in 2007, two annual speech contests for Miami-Dade and FIU students taking Chinese, and training sessions for teachers of Chinese language in Miami-Dade county.

During the summer of 2008, Mali traveled to China with Dr. Heine to discuss developing study abroad and exchange program opportunities with universities in Shanghai and Hangzhou.

Sponsored by IAS, the Southern Japan Seminar held its Spring 2008 meeting at Florida International University on March 1. The seminar brought together scholars from the southeast United States to discuss current trends in Japanese studies.

The first panel had several presentations on the end of Tokugawa history, including responses of groups from various social statuses to the appearance of comets and natural disasters.

Education and culture was the focus of the second panel, including "sacred pariahs" in atomic bomb literature, Zen and American popular culture, and lexical borrowing through globalization in China and Japan.

The third panel discussed

women's entertainment in Japan, such as the Miss Universe pageant in post-war Japan, the changing images of female idols in contemporary Japan, and new trends in the production of ladies' comics.

In 2007-2008, IAS hosted the first year of the National Consortium for Teaching about Asia (NCTA), a nationwide professional development program for K-12 teachers to encourage teaching and learning about Asia. Participants are required to create lesson plans infused with Asian content.

Eighteen participants attended the 2007-2008 NCTA sessions from schools throughout Florida. Registration for the 2008-2009 session has far exceeded expectations, reinforcing the importance of such programs, as Asia becomes an increasingly influential leader in globalization.

IAS was also involved in the NSF PIRE Project in partnership with FIU's School of Computing and Information Sciences, the Department of Computer Science and Engineering at Florida Atlantic University, and IBM Research Worldwide together with a number of international. Participants from around the world worked towards developing methodologies, platforms, and tools for creating Ciberinfrastructure applications.

IAS organized and supervised culture and language orientations for the PIRE participants travelling to Argentina, China, India, Mexico, and Spain. IAS would like to thank the instructors who helped facilitate the workshops: Laura Massa for Argentina, Li Ma for China, Kishore Dhavala for India, Luis Alvarado for Mexico, and Marie Guiribitry for Spain.
