ASIAN STUDIES

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Based on a dynamic reorganization of international studies programs at FIU, Asian Studies is now housed in the new School of International and Public Affairs (SIPA), along with several interdisciplinary or cross-cultural units with a focus on area studies and world affairs. including the African and African Diaspora Studies Program, the Gordon Institute for Public Policy, and the Latin American and Caribbean Center.

SIPA is a central division of the College of Arts and Sciences and was officially launched this past spring of 2009. Its primary aim is to fulfill the mission of Florida International University to create mutual understanding among the Americas and throughout the world by using an excellence in

teaching, innovative academic programs, and cutting-edge research to face the global challenges of the 21st century. SIPA is an affiliated member of APSIA (Association of Pro~ fessional Schools of Inter~ national Affairs) and is in the process of developing a professional M.A. degree on Global Affairs with tracks in globalization and economics, national and human security, and social identities.

Asian Studies Director Steven Heine has been appointed the Associate Director of SIPA and helps coordinate the various area studies programs. The Director of SIPA, John F. Stack, Jr. strongly supports the Asian Studies program and has commented: "I am quite pleased with Asian Studies' progress in the B.A.

and M.A. programs and I look forward to their future growth as well as the proliferation of other interdisciplinary programs by cultivating these multicultural and interdisciplinary approaches under SIPA."

SIPA also houses the departments of Politics and International Relations, Global and Sociocultural Studies, Public Administration, and Criminal Justice. The groundbreaking cere~ mony for the new SIPA building now being constructed was held on December 18, 2008. The Japanese Consul General Watanabe attended the event as a special guest.

NEW DUAL DEGREE PROGRAM IMPLEMENTED

Asian Studies and the International Relations Department are proud to offer a new joint degree program, with an M.A. in Asian Studies and a Ph.D. in International Relations.

This course of study encourages students with highly specialized interest in Asia to pursue graduate studies at FIU at more advanced levels. The program will equip students with the discipline of International

Relations as well as an area studies expertise in Asia to help them stay competitive in seeking careers with an international focus in today's global, cultural, and commercial environment.

The combined M.A./Ph.D. program is attractive in enabling students to complete the two degrees more quickly than would be the case if these were pursued sequentially. It also serves to formalize their

training in Asia-related international affairs.

Faculty teaching in International Relations with an East Asian concentration include Tom Breslin (Chinese Foreign Policy), Paul Kowert (Japan-US Relations), Eric Messersmith (Politics of Japan), and Julie Zeng (Chinese International Political Economy). In spring 2010, Zeng will offer a new course on the political economy of China.

SPOTLIGHT ON PROFESSOR NAOKO KOMURA

Naoko Komura has been a full-time instructor of Japa-



nese language for two years. From the start, Komura Sensei has been beloved and respected by her students, who enjoy her exuberant and effective teaching methods and cheerful disposition. She has taught Japanese levels I through V and, most recently, the Conversation and Composition class.

In collaboration with her senior colleague, Asuka Mashav, Komura Sensei's efforts have helped contribute to the steady growth of Japanese language enrollment and course offerings. Her courses emphasize skills in reading, writing, listening, and speaking Japanese. This skill base enables students to meet the requirements for the Japanese Studies Certificate program and also prepare for the standardized Japanese Language Proficiency Test (JLPT).

In addition to her teaching responsibilities, Komura Sensei is the faculty advisor for the growing Japan Club, which features a dynamic series of events for students planning to study or work abroad. She is the program director of our popular Summer Intensive Language and Culture program held for six weeks at Ritsumeikan University in Kyoto. Komura Sensei has also been very much involved in organizing the annual speech contests for Miami-Dade county and FIU students sponsored by the Association of Florida Teachers of Japanese and the Japanese Consulate in Miami.

ASIAN STUDIES RESEARCH/SERVICE

The Southern Japan Seminar and Asian Studies are pleased to announce the publication of the thirteenth volume of the Japan Studies Review, an annual peer-reviewed journal. This year's articles cover a broad range of topics, including: the detachment of youth characters depicted in literature and song; the use of hands in healing practices of Japanese religious cults in Brazil; the role of Ganguro in Japanese popular culture and identity conflicts; the spread of New Religions such as Soka Gakkai in East Asia, the shortcomings of pre-WWII democracy in Japan analyzed through class relations; ladies' comics in relation to Japanese society; a Confucian-style approach to disaster relief for late Tokugawa-era poverty; and the study of the "sacred pariahs" in atomic bomb literature discussed in terms of alterity, sexuality, and salvation. In addition, there is a section of reviews of recent scholarly works. Sponsored annually by the FIU Asian Studies Program, the Southern Japan Seminar held its Spring 2009 meeting in Miami on March 14. The seminar brings together scholars from the southeast United States and other regions to discuss current trends in Japanese studies. The Seminar featured two keynote speakers, Marvin

Sterling and Jacqueline Stone. Other visiting speakers included John Tucker, Jan Bardsley, Kinko Ito, Yuki Watanabe, Inger Bodey, Laura Miller, and Kenneth Holloway.

The first panel had several presentations on the role of sacred space in Japan, including case studies of two contrasting Tokyo neighborhoods; how Japanese Buddhism has conceived of the nation as an example of cosmic space; and cultural representations of the 47 Ronin at Sengakuji temple in southeast Tokyo.

Gender, play, and popular culture in Japan today was the focus of the second panel, including presentations on Maiko pop, sexuality in ladies' comics, the "masculine" in pop culture, and about the reception of Jane Austen in Japan.

In addition, the second year of the National Consortium for Teaching about Asia (NCTA), a nationwide professional development program for K-12 teachers to encourage pedagogy and learning about Asia, was hosted by FIU Asian Studies and included twenty-two enthusiastic participants from schools throughout South Florida. The teachers are required to design lesson plans that are infused with Asian content. Some interesting topics that were created this year include: Hip-Hop, Art, and Exchange in the Floating World, Skating Shanghai, and the Globalization of Robotics in Medicine.

SPOTLIGHT ON JAPAN CLUB

The Japan Club of FIU is dedicated to the advancement of U.S./Japanese relations via educational seminars, hands-on cultural experiences, guest lecturers, and the whims of its members. Above all, we wish to promote a fun and memorable experience that pairs those who have been to Japan with those still wishing to travel and study abroad.
