Susan,

We are on the verge of submitting a substantial revision of our undergraduate curriculum to the SIPA curriculum committee (March 10 is the deadline, which I hope we will make). The revision is a follow-up to renaming the degree: from bachelors in public administration to bachelors in public policy and service. Prior to this revision, only the name was different.

The form I use to submit the revised curriculum suggests that I contact your office if one of several criteria is met; in our case, we are expanding our core curriculum from 8 courses to 10 courses, deleting several courses from the core, and adding 6 new courses. It is that last bit -- Will a significant number of

new courses or content be required (defined as 25% - 33% or more new content/courses)? – that prompts me to write you now.

Below is a list of the new courses and tentative course descriptions. The first three are revisions of existing courses (we already have policy analysis, budgeting, and management courses). The next three are entirely new. I do not think we are encroaching on any other program since all of these are focused on public policy and not science or engineering. The course called “South Florida Urban Laboratory,” for example, will draw on the work of the Metropolitan Center and is not a laboratory course in the same way as a physics or chemistry course.

PUP4*** Analytical Tools for Public Service: Equips students with data skills for public policy analysis and public service applications.

PUP4*** Public Service Leadership and Management: Provides students with tools for setting goals, organizing resources, motivating and supervising personnel, and managing projects in multiple institutional settings.

PUP4*** Public Service Budgeting and Fiscal Management: Trains students to create, manage, analyze, and present financial information.

PUP4*** South Florida Urban Laboratory: An in-depth exploration of major public issues confronting urban South Florida with a focus on developing and implementing multi-sectoral solutions.

PUP4*** Urban Resilience and Sustainability Policies in a Global Context: Examines urban responses to the challenges of climate change from around the globe with an emphasis on local adaptation of successful techniques and approaches.

PUP4*** Global Perspectives on Urban Poverty, Inequality, and Economic Development: Compares public policies and organizational techniques for responding to urban poverty and growing economic inequality.

So I am following protocol here with the hope that this passes muster as standard curricular updating in response to changes in the field.

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Public Policy and Administration Undergraduate Degree Change (March 2020)

Rationale: The Department changed the name of its undergraduate degree in Spring 2019 from the Bachelor of Public Administration to the Bachelor of Public Policy and Service. The attached program changes implement substantive differences in degree structure and course content implied in the name change. They reflect the change in emphasis in our field from traditional public administration (the management of governmental organizations, personnel rules, organizational behavior, public sector budgeting, etc.) to a broader treatment of techniques and strategies used to pursue public objectives in multiple institutional settings (public, nonprofit, intersectoral collaboration, etc.). The curriculum will embody the program mission: *The Bachelor of Public Policy and Service provides students with the knowledge, skills, and abilities for careers in the public and nonprofit sectors and equips them to contribute to creative problem solving, leadership and management in complex urban environments in this country and globally.* The curriculum also reflects an observation in the *FIU Next Horizon 2025 Strategic Plan*: that South Florida is “one of the world’s most visited living laboratories” (page 1). Revised course content will highlight examples of local policy challenges and innovations, as well as the work of the Perez Metropolitan Center in its efforts to advise public-service organizations in their quest to make South Florida a better place to work and live.

Examines organizational societal value structures, and the ways in which technology creates rapid change and new alternatives in values. Interrelationship of the past, present, and future is explored.

PAD 4713 Computer Applications for Urban Services (3). The study of computer applications for administrative analysis of financial and program data with emphasis on design, interface, and data structures.

PAD 4723 Applied Research Methods for Policy & Management (3). Research design, sampling, critical evaluation, basic research ethics, and qualitative and quantitative methods and analysis. Must be taken in first 12 hours of upper-division coursework.

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Examines the clash between established institutional values and minority group values, and surveys remedial programs aimed at dealing with the problem. Comparative case studies will be used to analyze public agencies' internal relations with minorities (recruiting, selection, etc.), as well as their different responses to the minority groups they serve.

PAD 5256 Public Economics and Cost Benefit Analysis (3). This course provides the quantitative and qualitative tools and case material to solve allocation problems in the public sector. Applied microeconomic theory, welfare economics, and market and government failure are analyzed as are the public alternatives available. Cost-benefit analysis, the ethics of applied practice, and the important skills of communicating with decision makers are included.

PAD 5416 Social Equity and Human Resource Management (3). The course deals with the human resource management issues arising from equity and affirmative action requirements in the workplace.

PAD 5427 Collective Bargaining in the Public Sector (3). The course deals with the nature and implications of collective bargaining for managers and employees in (and students of) public organizations. The course emphasizes similarities and differences between the private and public sectors, as they apply to collective bargaining.

PAD 5435 Administration and the Role of Women (3). The course is designed for women and men who are interested in moving into management positions, or who have done so and want to broaden their understanding of the changing role of women. Classes will allow for experimental as well as academic exploration of the issues. The course will also

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explore design, implementation, and evaluation of affirmative action programs.

PAD 5443 The Public Administrator and Media Relations (3). Surveys the government-mass communication media relationship, and then concentrates on the ways in which public managers handle media relations. Emphasis throughout is placed on questions of information-handling unique to public organizations, involving, for example, adherence to Florida's Sunshine Law and the Federal Freedom of Information Act.

PAD 5460 Productivity Improvement (3). Provides measures to improve organizational and worker productivity using applied behavioral science.

PAD 5616 Contracting and Managing Third Party Governments (3). Analyzes the legal foundations, administrative and economic characteristics of government instrumentality's as they are used to pursue public policy. Analyzes how and why different combinations of instrumentality's are used in different policy areas.

PAD 5660C Applied Legal Context of Public Administrators (3). An overview of constraints and latitude the legal system grants to public administrators and managers. Provides the applied legal information required to make effective decisions in the public sector.

PAD 5661C Management of Court-Agency Relations (3). Examines applied judicial-administrative relations with particular emphasis on administrative policymaking. Covers the legal, environmental, and political factors that influence administrative strategies of policy and program compliance.

PAD 5805 Economic Development and Urban Revitalization (3). This course is an

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interdisciplinary examination of research and practice in contemporary economic development, with emphasis on successful implementation in a variety of settings.

PAD 5934 Contemporary Issues in Public Administration (3). An analysis of major conceptual issues currently facing public administrators. May be repeated for credit.

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PUP 4* Public Service Leadership and Management (3).** Provides students with tools for setting goals, organizing resources, motivating and supervising personnel, and managing projects in multiple institutional settings.

PUP 4* Analytical Tools for Public Service (3).** Equips students with data skills for public policy analysis and public service applications.

PUP 4* Public Service Budgeting and Financial Management (3).** Trains students to create, manage, analyze, and present financial information for public service applications.
