Turmoil following the shocking murder of former Prime Minister Abe Shinzō on July 8, 2022, by a gunman who bore a grudge against the Unification Church (UC) has reinforced the fact that we must attend to religion in order to understand politics in Japan.

In this talk, Dr. Levi McLaughlin will contextualize popular and political reactions to revelations about the UC and its connections to lawmakers as he surveys how religions and religion-connected activists in Japan exert a decisive impact on vote-gathering, policymaking, and party politics. McLaughlin will draw on his ethnographic engagements to provide an overview of Shinto-affiliated nationalists (including the lobby organization Nippon Kaigi and its signatories).
